OUR PROGRAM:

Horizon Prison Initiative seeks to change high-risk behavior and thinking patterns of men and women who are or have been incarcerated. We currently have programs at two correctional facilities in Ohio: London Correctional Institution for men (LoCI) in London and the Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW) in Marysville.

Participants live in dormitory style arrangements, separate from the general population, throughout the yearlong program. They take courses, build a community, and learn how to get along together living in a functional "family".

FROM THE DESK OF OUR DIRECTORS

This year marks 23 years that Horizon Prison Initiative (HPI) has provided faith-based, residential programming for men and women, regardless of faith tradition through character reformation, trauma-informed healing, building community, and numerous electives addressing addiction, parenting, life skills and more.

Our program is at capacity at both London Correctional Institution and the Ohio Reformatory for Women with a waiting list at the women's prison. The Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) has awarded a contract for fiscal years 2024 and 2025. ODRC funding provides a stronger position to serve our clients "inside the walls" and provides funding for basic services.

The graduation ceremonies held at both institutions celebrated the achievements of over 120 participants. The keynote speaker at the Ohio Reformatory for Women was Lieutenant Governor Jon Husted who praised the women for their hard work leading to their successful completion of the 10-month program. We are grateful to Channel 6 (WSYX) for their coverage of this story. You'll find more about this on the 2023 Horizon Highlights page.

The Horizon Prison Initiative is also sustained through the support of community donors and the dedication of staff and volunteers who believe in the restoration and transformation of the human spirit.

- Big and small donations from people across Ohio, as well as other parts of the country, are always needed to provide for additional programming needs beyond basic services.
- Donors, grants from the Siemer Family Grant, The Dominican Sisters of Peace Shalom fund and Sisters of the Precious Blood Heritage Mission Fund. These funds provide opportunities for additional programs beyond the ODRC contract.
- This year Horizon initiated reentry programming at both facilities and is partnering with re-entry programs in the community to assure the continuation of support for all justice involved individuals post release.

HORIZON HIGHLIGHTS

Horizon Prison Initiative (HPI) received a multi-year, faith-based grant for the first time from Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC).

The grant covered costs of basic programming for the 2023 class cycles at London Correctional Institution (LoCI) and the Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW).

This new partnership is confirmation that the mission of HPI has made a significant impact in the lives of our clients, families, and communities in Ohio, slowing the rate of recidivism.

HORIZON HIGHLIGHTS

Horizon was spotlighted on ABC 6 News.

On June 9th 2023, Lt. Governor Jon Husted was the keynote speaker for the Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW) graduation in Marysville, OH. Seventy-six (76) women who successfully completed the 10-month Horizon Prison Initiative program participated in the celebration. The women put on a skit based on the Wizard of Oz. It was a creative retelling from the point of view of women who are behind the walls.

That same weekend, 57 men at London Correctional Institution (LoCI) in London, OH celebrated their completion of the program.

OHIO REFORMATORY FOR WOMEN (ORW)

Horizon's partnership with Accompanying Returning Citizens with Hope (ARCH) opened the door to many opportunities.

ARCH is a reentry non-profit in Franklin County that helps returning citizens secure housing and employment upon release from prison.

This year, Horizon completed its first year of offering re-entry programs and services for the soon-to-be-released. It has been both a challenge and a rewarding experience to see women in the community after seeing them on the inside. Re-entry in Ohio is the undertaking of preparing women and men to be successful in returning home after incarceration.

ARCH interns from Notre Dame led a **spirituality group** about the 12 steps based on the book, *Breathing Under Water: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps*, by Richard Rohr.

- Held in June-July 2023, the group met once a week for two and a half hours for each session.
- Multiple faiths were represented.

ARCH trained three Horizon cohorts of 12 each from August 2022-August 2023 to prepare them for going home. This course is a requirement for those who are accepted into ARCH's Getting Ahead reentry program.

The Getting Ahead program has a long waiting list that ARCH fills with Horizon graduates who are scheduled for release in the next 60-90 days.



LONDON CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION (LoCI)

LoCi's program continues to be at full capacity. In June 2023, 57 men graduated from the Horizon program and received certificates.

Men received certificates of completion from the 2022-2023 cycle. Families and friends were treated to an incredible meal provided by Vicky Justus, Deputy Warden. We extended our heartfelt thanks to her for providing the meal. Families and program graduates were able to spend at least an hour or more following the ceremony.

Following the completion of this cycle, the graduates along with program staff began preparing for the next cycle by interviewing candidates and assisting those who are preparing for release within the next 12 months through our re-entry initiative.



LoCI's Community Resource Coordinator



Mujeddid Muhammad

As a former participant of the Horizon Program and presently serving in the capacity of Community Resource Coordinator, my foremost role is to serve as a living example of successful reintegration following incarceration.

Since my release in 2018, I have achieved significant milestones in my personal and professional development. I earned an Associate Degree in Social Work from Columbus State Community College and am currently pursuing a Bachelor's degree at Capital University.

In addition to my academic pursuits, I have obtained certifications as a Certified Peer Supporter and the Certificate for Qualification of Employment, among various other re-entry credentials, all of which equip me with valuable skills for working with individuals who have been involved with the justice system.

In my capacity as Community Resource Coordinator, I actively engage in a range of activities and initiatives aimed at assisting individuals in the process of reintegration. These include participation in men's mentoring groups, facilitating re-entry information sessions, conducting workshops on trauma-informed awareness, and collaborating with various re-entry stakeholders.

My primary objective is to establish connections between available resources and individuals preparing to transition from the Horizon Re-entry program back into the community. To facilitate this, I initiate the process by having Horizon Residents complete a detailed profile questionnaire upon their entry into the program.

Following a thorough review of the profile questionnaire, I arrange Teams meetings with program participants. During these meetings, I seek to gain a comprehensive understanding of their immediate re-entry needs by asking clarifying questions based on their responses.

Subsequently, I leverage my network of contacts and resources within the respective counties to address any issues that can be resolved while the individuals are still incarcerated. For matters that require post-release attention, I ensure they are connected to the appropriate service providers and agencies.

Beyond this initial support, I remain an ongoing mentor and resource for these individuals, extending my assistance as needed following their release.

My commitment is to guide and support them in their journey toward successful reintegration into society.


Helen Elaine Lee will be coming to ORW to do a reading from her recent publication, **Pomegranate**.

HORIZON'S FINANCIAL IMPACT

Housing prisoners is expensive.

• Ohio taxpayers pay \$37,595 per prisoner per year.

Horizon graduates have a much lower recidivism rate.

- In Ohio, the typical inmate has a 27% chance of returning to prison within three years of being released.
- Horizon lowers that rate to just 9%.

Donating to Horizon is a good investment.

 The cost to send an incarcerated individual through Horizon's full-time intensive, 10-month, residential program is approximately \$1,600 - \$1,800.



For every 10 Horizon graduates who stay out of prison, the state saves \$376,000 per year.
